First Pilot Proficiency Class of the 2018 Season! iPad Basic & Aviation Weather Apps

Starting off the VC99's 18th year of pilot proficiency classes was Brian Schiff, who taught an excellent program on iPad Basics & Aviation apps. His interesting and entertaining style had the audience focused the entire evening.

Looking for a new iPad? Consider at minimum the iPad Air, with at least 32 gigabytes of memory if possible. When deciding on display size, consider your individual cockpit when making a decision. If

you get iPad with cellular, it has an internal GPS even if you don't activate the service. To save money, you can always use the WiFi hot-spot on your phone if needed.

Can iPad replace paper? The answer is yes for general aviation VFR and IFR, however make sure there is no avionics interference, you have the functional equivalent of the paper material, and the

data is current. <u>However, you cannot use the iPad</u> <u>for navigation – only for situational awareness.</u> And remember, before updating the iOS, wait until your favorite aviation app vets the program first.

Battery management tips: We all know to reduce screen brightness, but did you know that location services can really soak up battery life? Go to Settings > Privacy > Location Services and turn off as many of possible.

Velma mentors 12 robotics teams in Ventura

County, helping them get their clubs set up and running. She has been in education for 25 years and her dedication is inspiring. The teams are currently getting ready for the Ventura **Regional FIRST Robotics** competition on March 29-31. Each team entering gets the contest theme on January 6 and they have only 6 weeks and limited budget to build and program an industrial sized robot to

activities that captured the enthusiasm of students, and decided that combining the excitement of sports competition with science and technology had potential.

Not only do the students learn the building side of robotics such as design, engineering, programming, 3-D printing and building, they also learn



play a difficult field game against competitors from all over the world. If they are successful, they will go on the the FIRST Championship in April.

The theme of the 2018 Regionals is FIRST POWER UP. FIRST Stands for- 1.For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology and was founded in 1989 by engineer and entrepreneur Dean Kamen, who invented the Segway. Kamen was disappointed with the number of kids—particularly women and minorities—who were interested in science and technology careers, and decided to do something about it. As an inventor, he looked for the business side such as fundraising, schmoozing, teamwork, branding, budgeting and how to run a business. Students also go on to mentor younger students in Lego Leagues.

They are in need of volunteers for the Ventura Regional on March 29-10. Please consider volunteering to be a judge at this fun event. They especially need women judges and mentors. 2016 Award Winner's Thanks

Thank you Ventura County 99s for the Karen Johnson Advanced Rating scholarship I was awarded last December, with additional thanks to Mark King at CP Aviation in Santa Paula for his instruction toward my commercial rating, which has opened many doors for me.

As many of you may know, my current aviation focus is on aerobatics. I just finished my second year of competing in International Aerobatics Club (IAC) contests in the Southwest. I began 2017 with the knowledge that I needed to purchase an aerobatic plane of my own if I was to continue progressing and eventual reach my goal of being on the U.S. Advanced Aerobatic Team. After much searching, the perfect aircraft appeared on the scene this summer: an Extra 300 midwing that was locallyowned. The one caveat as I jumped through the hoops of ownership: I needed a commercial rating to be insurable in such a high-performance plane. Thankfully, I finished up this rating just as I completed the checkout in my new plane and a thorough aerobatic safety course at Tutima Academy of Aviation Safety. So I'm now happily rolling, looping and spinning above the skies these days as I continue to perfect my skills.

The summer I also began glider lessons at Southern California Soaring Academy with the intent to complete my commercial add-on rating. Happy to report that I soloed in mid-September and have my checkride scheduled for mid-November. Soaring is such a different experience from power planes — gotta make every landing count and it's so very quiet. I plan to also learn how to tow gliders with my taildragger experience, combining the two worlds. (They need a female tow pilot out there at Crystal!) I've also begun volunteering with the school's STEM program exposing with eighth graders to soaring and providing first glider rides. And, finally, finishing my commercial rating allows me to pursue my flight instructor ratings. I've already taken the CFI, CFI-I and FOI writtens and have my advanced and instrument ground instructor certificate. My goals for this are a bit less defined, but I think I want to teach aerobatics and upset recovery, although I wouldn't rule out a midcareer change into aviation. The more I fly, the more I love it, and the more I want to share it with others. Thanks again VC99s!



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Oxnard STEM Day for Girls

California Aeronautical University teamed up with the VC99s Sierra Garlinger and Alison Barker to participate in the 2nd annual STEM Day for Girls on December 2nd. About 300 middle school girls from Oxnard Union school district came to Hueneme High School at 8 am on a Saturday to learn about STEM careers with mechanical, computer, aeronautical and electrical engineering themes.

STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. The goal of STEM day is to inspire our future workforce and introduce girls to different STEM careers they may not be aware of.

The event was kicked off by Mary Anne Rooney, of the Ventura County Civic Alliance, followed by opening remarks from Rebecca Chandler, Director of Career Education. Silvia Faulstich of NAVAUR gave the keynote address.

Students then separated into groups and attended 3 different 40 minute long workshops. The VC99s and CAU represented the Aeronautical theme. CAU brought their Mobile Simulator Experience Bus which allows students fly aircraft in a simulator. We set up the sim so they took off at Oxnard airport and were able to see the scenery above their houses and towns. While waiting for their turn in the Sim, students learned about engineering and aeronautical principles through a hands-on paper airplane building and test flying experiment with competitions and prizes for accuracy and distance. The students also got an overview about pilot careers and the Bachelors of Science Degree in Aeronautics offered by CAU.
