Peggy Watson-Meinke took her beautiful StarLite Hot Air Balloon to the seventh annual Havasu Balloon Festival, and I went out to be a part of her crew. The festival activities take place on an island that is reached via the London

Bridge. Activities include carnival rides, food and merchandise vendors, and the evening balloon glow.

Early Friday morning we laid out the tarps in a parking lot on the mainland, and stretched out the envelope (balloon) to begin inflation. Peggy had her eye on the shifting winds, and watched as a few balloons took flight. She noticed that most balloons headed out over the lake, not the direction she wanted to go. The morning flight was aborted, and we packed the balloon back into the trailer. The afternoon weather was still not favorable. Saturday morning we woke up to stormy weather, and all festival activities were cancelled. This was the first time in seven years that weather has been so uncooperative.



Happy New Year VC99s!! I have to apologize for neglecting the Flyer the last two months. In November I had to make an emergency trip to Nashville as my father had fallen and broke his leg. It was good to spend time with him and help him through rehab. I came home then went back to Nashville again on December 15th as dad had suddenly take a turn for the worse as the result of


a blood infection. Sadly, on the 21st he passed away, my son, Brandon and I were at his bedside. We had the funeral service and burial with Military Honors on Jan 6th. (If you get a chance, check out the tribute I wrote for him on www.tributes.com/James-Ward-Watson and check out the obituary and photos.) I returned to California on January 9th then turned around and left again for the Lake Havasu Balloon Festival just a day later. Whew. VC99 Janeen Gaul came

to that event with two friends and has written an article, later in this issue. Now I am back from that trip trying to catch up on life.

As I was writing my father's tribute/obituary, and was going through his flying career and memorabilia, it was hard not to brag about what an amazing pilot he was. I found his original pilot log book he started in 1952 when he was flying his 1947 Aeronca Champ at 20 years old. It shows his first passenger was his girlfriend at the time (my mother) and his own mother. Then there was an entry about an "emergency landing" in a field. He never told me about that one! The entries go until 1954 then do not pick up again until 1975. There is a note at the bottom of the page stating

that 1955 – 1975 were military flying hours as shown in the summary page in front of the log book. And there it was, a folded military summary page of his flying record. He had 4,327 hours in a total of 18 different military jets, and 240 combat hours in Vietnam. The log book entries started up again in 1975 after retiring from the Air Force. There are several different ratings including CFI and CFII. I never knew he did that either. I guess he had to get those ratings in order to fly commercially. He then flew for a commuter airline around the Midwest for a few years. I remember him joking that he didn't like having to fly into Chicago O'Hare with an airplane full of passengers, in weather that the Air Force would never have allowed him to fly in with a jet just by himself. Ha.





Dad just did not realize what an impact he would have on several family members for the next three generations. Besides his brother becoming a pilot, I had his flying spirit and got my pilot license in 1986. Then his nephew, David Shoemaker, who as a kid always admired the model airplane collection of six of the fighter jets dad flew, decided to join the Air Force and become a pilot like his Uncle Ward. My dad pinned him upon graduating from the Air Force Academy in 1996. He is now a full Colonel and the wing commander for a squadron of F-16s at Luke AFB in Arizona! And then my son Brandon, who also admired those model jets up on the shelf, is attending the CONTINUED ON PAGE 4

He is a Private Pilot, currently working on his instrument rating, and taking a special interest to UAVs (Unmanned Arial Vehicles). Funny thing is, when Brandon came home for the summer after getting his pilot certificate, he got checked out at CP Aviation and rented a plane. Like my dad, his first real passengers were his girlfriend and his mom (me).

My dad didn't even mean to influence anyone into flying. But look what happened to me and two young men. It happened because of six model airplanes set in his bookshelf. As 99s it is our goal to influence kids, women, and people all around us to the joy of flying. Look how much more opportunity we have to influence by being a

99 and providing scholarships, setting up museum displays, helping with airshows, the list goes on.... I brought home those six model fighter jets of dad's and I plan to set them up on the bookshelf in my hangar. My hope is that kids will come around during the Santa Paula first Sundays Open-House, and look at them, and inspire them to fly - like it did for David, Brandon, and me.

Even though dad wasn't responsive the last week in the Hospice Center, Brandon stayed with him every night to help keep him comfortable and so he would not be alone. While there he wrote a pretty long poem which he read at the memorial service. Here is the last verse:

So this isn't goodbye
Nor is it the end
I'll fly in your name
And I'll tell you all about it
When I see you again



UPDATE: THE VIEWPORT at Camarillo Airport

The Ventura County 99s, in collaboration with the Department of Airports, are currently building the final phase of The Viewport. We listen to your suggestions. Over the years, we have changed the applications to make them simpler. You said that the milestone concept is great but it would be nice to receive some money upon winning the scholarship. There is now a kick start payment made within a week of winning. You wanted electronic submissions—we now encourage applicants to email their applications. You wanted variety. We work to mix up the opportunities for licensed as well as student pilots. In spring of 2017, there will be a \$1,000

scholarship available for advanced training called the Endorsement Challenge - whether your goal is a tailwheel, high performance, complex or seaplane endorsement or possibly an emergency maneuvers training module, this is for you. This scholarship is open to 99s in Ventura, San Fernando or Santa Barbara. The application deadline is May 15th.

There is also another student pilot scholarship with a deadline of March 1, 2017.
